Membership Eligibility

Any man shall be eligible for membership in this Society who, being of the age of eighteen years or over and a citizen of good repute in the community, is the lineal descendant of an ancestor who was at the time unfailing in loyalty to, and rendered active service in, the cause of the American Independence, either as an Officer, Soldier, Seaman, Marine, Militiaman, or Minuteman, in the armed forces of the Continental Congress, or of any one of the several Colonies or States; or as a Signer of the Declaration of Independence, or as a member of a Committee of Safety or Correspondence; or as a member of any Continental, Provincial or Colonial Congress or Legislature; or as a recognized patriot who performed actual service by overt acts of resistance to the authority of Great Britain; provided, however, that no person advocating the overthrow of the Government of the United States by use of force or violence shall be eligible for membership in this Society.

Chapter History

The first organizational meeting of what would become the Brevard Chapter FLSSAR was held in the dining room of the Brevard Hotel (no longer extant) of Cocoa, Florida on January 25, 1967. Compatriot V Winthrop O'Hara, President of the Florida Society SAR, attended this meeting to explain to the 'Organizing Committee" the procedure to be followed in establishing a Chapter.

It was not until July 25, 1969 that Marshall E Barton, Florida Society SAR, signed the official Charter for the Brevard Chapter.
